# Regional EMS Councils in the Code of Virginia

§ 32.1-111.11. Regional emergency medical services councils.

The Board shall designate regional emergency medical services councils which shall be authorized to receive and disburse public funds. Each council shall be charged with the development and implementation of an efficient and effective regional emergency medical services delivery system.

The Board shall review those agencies that were the designated regional emergency medical services councils. The Board shall, in accordance with the standards established in its regulations, review and may renew or deny applications for such designations every three years. In its discretion, the Board may establish conditions for renewal of such designations or may solicit applications for designation as a regional emergency medical services council.

Each council shall include, if available, representatives of the participating local governments, fire protection agencies, law-enforcement agencies, emergency medical services agencies, hospitals, licensed practicing physicians, emergency care nurses, mental health professionals, emergency medical technicians, and other appropriate allied health professionals.

Each council shall adopt and revise as necessary a regional emergency medical services plan in cooperation with the Board.

The designated councils shall be required to match state funds with local funds obtained from private or public sources in the proportion specified in the regulations of the Board. Moneys received directly or indirectly from the Commonwealth shall not be used as matching funds. A local governing body may choose to appropriate funds for the purpose of providing matching grant funds for any council. However, this section shall not be construed to place any obligation on any local governing body to appropriate funds to any council.

The Board shall promulgate, in cooperation with the State Emergency Medical Services Advisory Board, regulations to implement this section, which shall include, but not be limited to, requirements to ensure accountability for public funds, criteria for matching funds, and performance standards.

## Lord Fairfax EMS Council Regional Facts



The Lord Fairfax EMS Council region encompasses the counties of Clarke, Frederick, Page, Shenandoah, Warren, and the independent City of Winchester. The region is one of the faster growing areas in the Commonwealth of Virginia. The region includes a population of 235,316 and covers 1,859 square miles. Winchester Medical Center is a Level II Trauma Center, Level I Primary Stroke Center, and Chest Pain Center with Primary PCI; Page, Shenandoah, and Warren Memorial Hospitals are all Critical Access hospitals. Warren Memorial Hospital is a fully-accredited Chest Pain Center and Shenandoah Memorial Hospital is a Level IV Initial Entry Access Stroke Center.

## Regional Infrastructure

- The Council currently maintains an office which is staffed full time five days a week from 8:00am to 4:00pm.
- Publishes bi-monthly financial reports, quarterly director's program reports, an annual report, committee minutes and attendance rosters, and other training and event advisories.
- Maintains and publishes regional EMS policies, By-Laws, and other plans and procedures.
- Maintains an interactive website that includes all regional plans, policies, and training calendars as well as the ability to register online for all Council classes.
- Held four Council Board of Director meetings and numerous committee meetings this past year.
- Provides representation on several local, regional, and statewide committees and Boards, including the Virginia EMS Advisory Board and its related committees, three Local Emergency Planning Committees (LEPCs), Northern VA Emergency Preparedness Team, Northwest Healthcare Coalition, several hospital committees, and Fire & Rescue Associations.
- Serves as EMS infrastructure point of contact for all EMS agencies, providers, hospitals, and local governments within the region and beyond.

## Regional Planning

- Revised, published, and distributed the Regional EMS Strategic Plan which includes core strategies and initiatives.
- Reviewed and revised the Regional Trauma Triage Plan.
- Continued to monitor and oversee the Drug Accountability, Exchange, and Control Policy program.
- Monitored and revised the Regional Stroke Plan with a regional committee. Reviewed and published Regional Hospital Diversion Plan.
- Continued to work with the regional Disaster Planning committee to review and revise the Mass Casualty Incident and Disaster Response Plan. Plans are in the works for an upcoming exercise.
- Introduced the regional Ebola Guidelines for Agencies and Responders three years ago and staff continues to monitor developments that would facilitate necessary changes to the program. The Council brought together all pertinent partners from EMS, dispatch centers, the hospitals, and the health department within the region to accomplish this.
- Introduced the Regional ST-Elevated Myocardial Infarction (STEMI) Plan three years ago in cooperation with **Valley Health Heart & Vascular Center**.

## EMS Training & Consolidated Test Site Administration



- The Council continues to provide assistance to the Lord Fairfax Community College EMS Program. The Regional Field Coordinator participates on the Curriculum Advisory Committee.
- The Council continues to provide training on the regional *Pre-Hospital Standard Patient Treatment Protocols*, and hopes to have online training as a new delivery method in 2020.
- Provided guidance for providers to use the OEMS provider portal for CE reports and all certification paperwork. Staff also answered numerous questions daily about continuing education requirements and other issues regarding certification.
- Facilitated funding for Fire & Rescue departments within the region provided by the VA Office of EMS to offer additional continuing education training and auxiliary courses such as ACLS, PALS, ITLS, etc.
- The Regional Field Coordinator began the process to become an EMS Educator, allowing for additional EMS training being provided within the region resulting in a larger number of EMTs and additional continuing education hours being provided. His anticipated completion date is January, 2020.
- With the increasing number of accredited EMS programs through the VA Office of EMS, the number of test sites that were held, along with the number of participants have

dropped considerably within the past 2-3 years. Last year, the Council held 5 test sites and tested a total of 120 candidates. This year the Council was only able to hold 2 sites with 34 EMT candidates. We continue to work with the VA Office of EMS to determine a better solution to this process. All testing was held at the **Winchester Church of God** and we thank the church for their continued support as we continue our quest to educate effective and quality EMS caregivers in our region.

- Developed and posted a testing schedule of dates, times, and locations and provided assistance to candidates registering online.
- Continued to offer the Pearson VUE Authorized Testing Center at the Council to allow EMS providers to complete their written National Registry testing to alleviate the need to travel outside the region. 269 EMS providers tested this past year, an increase of 24% from the previous year; and 680 individuals tested in other certifications such as GED, CISCO, CompTIA, VCLA, and many others. Recognizing that there's no other Pearson VUE test sites within the region, the Council feels it's important to continue to allow residents to test in other subjects.



### **Regional Medical Direction**

- Maintained a signed contract with a Regional Medical Director. **Dr. Christopher Turnbull** provides coverage for regional medical direction and works in concert with the other three Operational Medical Directors within the region. Dr. Turnbull also serves as the Medical Director for the City of Winchester, Valley Medical Transport, and Clarke County.
- Maintained and revised Pre-Hospital Standard Patient Care Treatment Protocols. A committee of the Council spends numerous hours each year reviewing and revising every protocol and medication in collaboration with the Medical Directors. The Council also provided logistics and training support and equipment to all the jurisdictions upon implementation.
- Hosted a workshop in April, 2019 for Operational Medical Directors provided by the VA Office of EMS with 7 participants.
- Requested and received funding early in 2019 to purchase Handtevy for all EMS agencies within the region that weren't already utilizing it. The Handtevy Pediatric System is the leading software solution designed to give EMS crews rapid access to lifesaving dosing information while documenting in real time. Treating the emergent pediatric patient is difficult and time sensitive for even the most advanced and skilled providers.

### **Regional Coordination**

- Reviewed and revised the Regional Medical/Trauma Performance Improvement Plans.
- Published a template for regional agency reporting and encouraged agency compliance.
- Provided technical assistance to EMS agencies on state regulations related to QA/QI reporting.
- Provided assistance regarding EMS issues such as continuing education, rules and regulations, reciprocity, affiliation changes, etc. to agencies within our region.
- Maintained an active website. Updates and minutes are continuously posted to the site. The Council posts upcoming events and training to the website for all agencies in our region and other EMS Councils across the Commonwealth. All regional plans are also

provided on the website. Registration for EMS & CPR training, as well as test site registration is completed online.

- Promoted the state RSAF grant program, provided grant reviews for the VA Office of EMS, provided technical assistance, and submitted grant reviews during two grant cycles this year. The Council's member agencies received **\$956,166** in grant funding during fiscal year 2019.
- Served as a clearinghouse for regional and state EMS information, posters, calendars, and other materials to be distributed to providers in our region.
- Provided volunteer and career referrals along with training course information in response to daily telephone and electronic inquiries.
- Staff assisted with the Worlds of Work held in Winchester in September, 2018. Each year, nearly 3,000 7th graders participate in hands-on career exploration with more than 80 businesses at Worlds of Work (WoW!).
- Held a Regional Awards Program June 29, 2019 in Strasburg, VA to recognize outstanding providers. The regional award winners were submitted to the VA Office of EMS for consideration of the Governor's EMS Awards. Winners included the following:

The Lord Fairfax EMS Council has provided AHA Training to universities, colleges, business offices, physician's offices, dentist's offices, schools, and large and small

business organizations during the year. A total of over 7,000 residents received education through our training center this year throughout the entire region. *[Exact figure not available at time of this report]*

## Virginia Office of Emergency Medical Services

The staff of the Lord Fairfax EMS Council and several regional agency personnel continue to serve on numerous state committees and represent this region at the state level. **Tracey McLaurin** serves as the representative and Vice Chairman to the Regional Executive Directors Group and is a member of the state Communications Committee. **Jon Henschel** serves on the State EMS Advisory Board and is chairman of the Rules & Regulations committee, Administrative Coordinator, and also on the Executive committee. **Dr. Chris Turnbull** represents our Council on the state Medical Direction committee.

## Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM)

The Council continues to provide a CISM Team comprised of 22 professionals who work with individuals or groups of emergency medical services, dispatch, fire, and police personnel who may suffer from stress after being involved in a critical incident. Team members provide pre-incident education and post-incident debriefing. All information remains confidential. **Mark Gleason** is the Clinical Coordinator for the team.
